#### **Pastor's Paragraphs**

What to do? What to do? What to do? Many people are asking this in light of the many changes coming from the executive branch of our federal government. While I have my opinions, they aren't important. I am not an expert in political science or in international relations. Our church denomination does have a social statement called *The Church in Society: a Lutheran Perspective*. It is helpful and I encourage you to read it. It is the product of those who do have expertise. (You can find it online with a search or I can give you a paper copy.) An important perspective that document takes is to remind us that we are in this world but not of this world. And also, that we should act in the present day with an eye towards eternity.

Consider this: Science can tell us there will be some point in the future when this planet will cease to be. That may be billions of years from now, but it will still happen. From the perspective of eternal life, those billions of years will be but a blink of time. Eternity still stretches beyond that.

From that we could easily conclude that the present day and this world don't matter. Yet Christian faith is based on God coming to be in human form; even dying to save creation. That means that limited as the creation is, God deeply values it. The present day is important to God. If it is important to God, then it is important to us; and we are important in it.

We are in this world but not of this world. Regardless of your political leanings, you are a citizen of God's kingdom first. No earthly government can offer you similar privileges or protections. It is idolatry to entirely trust a government or to expect a government to act on behalf of God.

Being in the world but not of the world is easier said than done. Government decisions impact every aspect of our lives: safety, the economy, education, medical care, and much more. Social conventions are also highly impactful. There is a pattern of life our society expects us to live by: grow up, get an education, get a job, own a home, have a family, save for retirement, die with dignity. Yet from the perspective of being citizens of God's kingdom, neither the government nor society should be guiding us. The earliest Christians considered themselves to be exiles in this world. It was a central part of their faith to *not* go along with society. So, what to do? We need to regularly take a critical look at our lives and what drives us. Consider life from the perspective of eternity and being a citizen in God's kingdom. Ask yourself questions like these: -Why do I have financial investments where I do? Have I just followed along with what society expects, or have I invested my resources in ways that reflect God's priorities?

-Where do I invest my time? Is it for my own amusement or for the accomplishment of God's kingdom? What priorities are revealed by my travels, vacations, hobbies, and social calendar?

-Where am I stretching and growing in order to stay an effective follower of Christ?

-How am I directly interacting with the problems and needs of my community, and in ways that are constructive?

-How is my need for God's grace reflected in my thoughts and actions?

I believe many people have removed themselves from the real work of life. They'd prefer to be advocates who fight for ideologies, rather than literally getting their hands dirty in the real work. Jesus wasn't an advocate. Jesus got his hands dirty.

What to do? If you're a citizen of God's kingdom with an eye towards eternity, be ready to do hard and enduring work. It will probably feel plain. It may feel too small to be of value. It may not get you ahead in life, but it is God's meaningful work.

What has Family Promise of Ontario County been up to in 2024??

Below is a breakdown of the impact that Family Promise of Ontario County made in 2024 by program:

• EMERGENCY SHELTER: We provided emergency shelter and case management for a

total of 8 families with 18 children in the 4 apartments in Canandaigua and Geneva.

• EVICTION PREVENTION: We were able to prevent 17 families with 33 children from

entering a homeless situation through our eviction prevention program.

• SHELTER DIVERSION: We were able to help 7 families move from a homeless situation

(couch surfing, living in motels, cars, etc.) to a place of their own.

• STABILIZATION: Once a family graduates from our shelter program we provide ongoing

assistance and support to help minimize the chance of them falling back into a homeless

situation. In 2024 we provided assistance for a total of 17 families with 52 children.

• COMMUNITY SUPPORT: From outreach to walk-ins we assisted 134 families and

individuals with a variety of support as needed.
